Sin and God's Wrath - and Lent

Sin is intrinsically a theological concept. You can have ethics, and fail your ethical code and still be an atheist. You can have a moral code and be an agnostic. But sin, sin is a Church word which means to be separated from God.

The Church has always believed that we are all sharers in a state of sin, calling it Original Sin. Original Sin is a state into which we are born, something shared by all human beings. It is humanity living together apart from God. Whatever your beliefs about the stories of Adam and Eve, their fall reflects the sad state of fallen human nature. Being subject to Original Sin, as we mature and grow we also develop patterns of sinful behavior that the Church calls Actual Sin - sinful stuff we are responsible for directly. They are the natural consequences of living as part of a race separated from God, even if baptized as a child. We just "pick it up" even before rational thought begins and it begins to snowball as we grow and age until we come to ourselves and turn to God.

Sin, again, means alienation from God. Our God is a God of love, but not a patsy. God is also a God of consuming holiness. In fact, according to the Bible, to see God is to die, to be consumed by his holiness. God's wrath and God's love are the two sides of God's paradoxical splendor. God's love and wrath are related like light and darkness are. And we - as the writer of Ephesians put it-- are "by nature children of wrath." (2:3) This is the result of both Original Sin and Actual Sin (collectively and individually). God's opposition to all sin is wrath. We in the modern Church have lost our nerve in proclaiming the truth about God and God's wrath. By doing so, we cheapen the Good News by watering down the Bad News from which we have been rescued.

What, then, about Lent? Well, both Original Sin and Actual Sin have dug tenacious roots in us by the time we are actually serious about life with God. Lent is when we, assured because of our baptism that he has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved son, can with the confidence of God's love look at some of the chaos within, address it and perhaps grow beyond it a little. I hope yours is a holy Lent.
